Welcome to the 14th Annual Tucson Fringe Festival!

I want to start by thanking everyone for being here. This festival would not exist if not for the dedicated festival goers we see year after year. I also want to thank the artists who apply for our festival every year and for bringing their creations to us. A special thank you to all our volunteers and staff. They are the backbone of this festival, and nothing would happen without their help. I cannot express enough gratitude for the time they have given to the festival.

We have made a lot of changes this year. The most significant change was to our schedule. We have eliminated performances that start after 9pm and now have performances on Thursday evening. We hope to have larger audiences at these new showtimes than we had at the late night showtimes. Another change is the kind of virtual content we have available. We have two pre-recorded performances on Vimeo that anyone can access when purchasing a ticket. This is our first year using Vimeo and we hope everyone has a good experience.

We have applied for grant funding to help us grow and achieve some goals for future festivals. We will not know what that grant award total will be until closer to the Summer. We also need more funding to help secure better venues that have the technology we'll need for performances as well as being ADA compliant. Costs of venues have increased that last few years.

Provide artists with ASL interpretation for their performances!

This is something that can be accomplished easily, but like so many things requires additional funding. If all goes well, we plan to have ASL interpreted available for any of the performances in our festival. We hope to also provide audio description of performances for the visually impaired.

Again, thank you all for coming and I look forward to seeing you all in years to come.

Tucson Fringe Fesitval Key

The Tucson Fringe Festival is unjuried, which means festival organizers don't hand pick the performance groups that get into the festival. In fact, it is literally luck of the draw (come to our lottery party in September)! We are also uncensored, which means if you can do it legally on a stage in the state of Arizona, you can do it at Tucson Fringe.

Part of the fun of Fringe is not quite knowing what you're going to get from each show. But at the same time, we want to make sure that you are warned about potentially upsetting content, something like a movie rating system. The performers themselves choose which tags to put on their shows. We hope this helps you make informed decisions about your Fringe schedule, and allows you to curate a festival experience that suits your interests and tastes.

Ocotillo Semi-Succulent Facts

Identifying Features

Ocotillo (*Fouquieria splendens*) are one of easiest plants to identify in the desert. They're a large shrub with long cane-like unbranched spiny stems that grow from a short trunk. Small 2 inch leaves will grow from the stems with enough moisture. Dense clusters of red tubular flowers grow from the end of the stems from March through June.



Size & Life Span

Ocotillo can reach heights of up to 20 feet. There is much discussion on exactly how old Ocotillo can live. A good estimate is 60 years although some studies indicate they can live well over 100 years.



Where to Fine Them

Ocotillo are common in most areas of the Sonoran and Chihuahuan deserts. They are also found in western Texas through to southern California. The Ocotillo is often used as "fencing" because its spines stop people and animals from passing through.



Has Many Names

The Ocotillo is called many different names including Candlewood, Slimwood, Coachwhip, Vine Cactus, Flaming Sword and Jacob's Staff.

How to Fringe

Is this your first time on the Fringe? Or maybe you're a Fringe Expert. Have you ever been to the grand-daddy Fringe Festival in Edinburgh? Whether you're a seasoned pro or a fringe noob, we're here to make sure your fringe experience is a good one.

STEP 1: Check out the schedule!

You're holding one in your hand. You can also head to tucsonfringe.org. Showtimes are subject to change and our website will have the most accurate information during the festival weekend.

STEP 2: Buy a ticket!

...or a two-show pass...or a five-show pass??? Whether you're only going to see one show or trying to catch as many as possible in the four days of the festival, we've got a ticketing option for you. Each show is only an hour long so catch a few!

STEP 3: Wear your fringe button!

This snazzy, shiny button, included in every ticket and pass, is what keeps Tucson Fringe going. Since most of the ticket revenue (\$12) goes back to the artists, revenue from the button (\$3) helps festival organizers pay for venue rentals, technicians, and festival marketing among other things. We also use the buttons to track festival attendance across multiple venues.

STEP 4: Tell us what you thought!

At each venue, you'll see post-it notes and scrap paper which you can write a little review or write a 1-5 star rating for the show. Or use the QR code on the schedule handout and fill out the review form online. If you're posting on social media, use the hashtags #tucsonfringe and #tucsonfringe2026 to share photos and your thoughts about the shows and festival.



Artist Bio:

ORIGINS OF THE FRINGE

In 1947, Edinburgh was host to the exclusive "Edinburgh Theatre Festival." But several performing groups thought, post WWII, this was a time to come together as artists and be more inclusive. So, eight theatre companies found alternative performance spaces around the outskirts (or "fringes") of Edinburgh and performed at the same time as the official festival. Since then, over 200 Fringe Festivals have popped up around the world, using a few basic tenets as their guiding principles:

- Lack of an "invitation" or jury system to choose who gets to perform.
- Using unconventional performance spaces in city centers.
- Returning 80-100% of ticket revenue to the performers.


The Show:

The Show:


The Emo Show explores the phenomenon that was the early 2000s emo/pop-punk scene and what it means to grow up alongside the music you love.

- There are over 200 Fringe Festivals all over the world, but we're the only one in Arizona!
- Performers at most Fringe Festivals receive 80% 100% of the ticket revenue.
- Since Tucson Fringe started in 2011, we've paid out over \$65,000 to over 200 performers. That's over 8,000 tickets sold!
- We've had performers from 15+ states including Arizona, New York, California, and Virginia. We've also had performers from India and the United Kingdom.
